MATCH HISTORY

International Women's Day



_____ is one of the most famous writers in English literature. Her books are read by people all over the world and have been made into countless TV, film, theatre, and radio adaptations. This is all the more impressive because she only wrote six full-length novels.

_____ ... reigned over Russia for 34 years—longer than any other female in Russian history. As empress, westernized Russia. She led her country into full participation in the political and cultural life of Europe. She championed the arts and reorganized the Russian law code. Greatest accomplishments include establishing educational reform, championing the arts, and extending Russia's borders in the largest territorial gain since Ivan the Terrible

_____ ... known as "the mother of the civil rights movement," walked into history on December 1, 1955, when she refused to give up her seat for a white man on

a Montgomery, Alabama bus. Parks was arrested for her defiance, and she agreed to challenge the segregation order in court.

_____ She became the first Hispanic woman to go to space when she served on the nine-day STS-56 mission aboard the space shuttle Discovery in 1993. She has flown in space four times, including STS-66, STS-96 and STS-110, logging nearly 1,000 hours in orbit.

_____ became an international symbol of the fight for girls' education after she was shot in 2012 for opposing Taliban restrictions on female education in her home country of Pakistan

_____ ... had a broad career as a singer, dancer, actress, composer, and Hollywood's first female black director, but became most famous as a writer, editor, essayist, playwright, and poet. As a civil rights activist, she worked for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Malcolm X.

_____ was one of the most iconic victims of the Holocaust. Her diary, written as a teenager from June 1942 to August 1944, describes her life hiding with her family and four other people in an Amsterdam attic. They were denounced on August 4, 1944. She was deported to Bergen-Belsen and perished in February 1945

_____ a 6th-century Byzantine empress married to Emperor Justinian I, is remembered for being one of the most powerful women in Byzantine history. She used her power and influence to promote religious and social policies that were important to her. She was one of the first rulers to recognize the rights of women.

_____ first woman of color and first Hispanic appointed as Supreme Court Justice of the United States. She was born in Brooklyn, New York, to a Puerto Rican migrant family and studied at both Princeton and Yale universities. During her studies, she was involved in Latino activist groups, such as the Puerto Rican Action Initiative. In 1980, she graduated as a lawyer and began a long and successful career as a lawyer and judge. In 2009, she made history as the first woman of color and first Hispanic to be appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court

_____ ... A former slave became an outspoken advocate for abolition, temperance, and civil and women's rights in the nineteenth century. Her Civil War work earned her an invitation to meet President Abraham Lincoln in 1864.
